### AREA TECHNOLOGY CENTER AND FACILITY CONSTRUCTION

The last few weeks have been very exciting as we are starting to see the first walls come up out of the ground as construction is in full swing on the New Estill County Area Technology Center. Codell Construction has done a fantastic job keeping the project on pace through some very difficult weather during the spring. We have a fantastic group of dedicated contractors on this project and we are thankful for their dedication and hard work. During the next few months this building will start to take shape and the Pedway to the high school is now under construction as well. This building will open August of 2021, and we are excited about the new opportunities our students will have in technical education.

The new Estill Transportation Center is also moving along rather nicely after a slow start due to adverse weather this winter. The project is around 25% complete at this time and the foundation have been poured and the building will soon be erected. This project is important to the safe transportation of our students and provides our transportation personnel with a first-class facility that they can be proud of. We expect final completion of this project sometime early this fall.

Lastly, we will be meeting with Ross Tarrant Architects on June 3 to discuss the final renovation of Estill County High School and our athletic facilities. Our community has been looking forward to this project and our Board desires to fulfill its promise to provide safety and energy upgrades to the high school, while also updating our athletic facilities that are in need of an update. These improvements include our football/soccer/track stadium, softball and baseball stadium upgrades, and new tennis courts. If all goes well we could begin construction by December 1 and be finished sometime in the spring of 2022. I will have a further update sometime this fall.

#### COMMUNITY EDUCATION

With schools closed many children and young people are spending all their time at home. Much of that time may be online, and often they will spend more time online than usual. Being able to connect online provides valuable opportunities to learn, play and socialize with friends and peers and access information and support and is therefore extremely important for children and young people. However, spending time online, what some call 'screen time', comes with risks.

Social networking sites, chat rooms, virtual worlds, and blogs are how teens and tweens socialize online; it's important to help your child learn how to navigate these spaces safely. Among the pitfalls that come with online socializing are sharing too much information or posting comments, photos, or videos that can damage a reputation or hurt someone's feelings.

Applying real-world judgment can help minimize those risks.

- Remind Kids That Online Actions Have Consequences
- Tell Kids to Limit What They Share
- Encourage Online Manners
- Limit Access to Your Kids' Profiles
- Talk to Kids About What They're Doing Online

Remind your children that online actions have consequences. The words kids write and the images they post have consequences offline. Kids should post only what they're comfortable with others seeing. Some of your child's profile may be seen by a broader audience than you – or they – are comfortable with, even if



privacy settings are high. Encourage your child to think about the language they use online, and to think before posting pictures and videos, or altering photos posted by someone else. Employers, college admissions officers, coaches, teachers, and the police may view your child's posts. Remind your children that once they post it, they can't take it back. Even if you delete the information from a site, you have little control over older versions that may exist on other people's computers and may circulate online. Tell your children not to impersonate someone else. Let your kids know that it's wrong to create sites, pages, or posts that seem to come from someone else, like a teacher, a classmate, or someone they made up. Tell your kids why it's important to keep some things – about themselves, family members, and friends – to themselves. Information like their Social Security number, street address, phone number, and family financial information – say, bank account or credit card numbers – is private and should stay that way.

Limit Access to Your Kids' Profiles by using privacy settings. Many social networking sites and chat rooms have adjustable privacy settings, so you can restrict who has access to your kids' profiles. Talk to your kids about the importance of these settings, and your expectations for who should be allowed to view their profile. Get to know the social networking sites your kids use so you understand their activities. If you're concerned about risky online behavior, you may want to search the social sites they use to see what information they're posting. Are they pretending to be someone else? Try searching by their name, nickname, school, hobbies, grade, or community. Ask your kids who they're in touch with online.

Just as you want to know who your kids' friends are offline, it's a good idea to know who they're talking to online. Encourage your kids to trust their guts if they have suspicions.

Encourage them to tell you if they feel threatened by someone or uncomfortable because of something online. You can then help them report concerns to the police and to the social networking site. Most of these sites have links for users to report abusive, suspicious, or inappropriate behavior.

Looking ahead to next school year, the district's mental health team is already collaborating and developing a plan for addressing the mental health needs of our students upon re-entry to school. In addition, the district has renewed contracts with New Vista and Mountain Comprehensive Care allowing the continuation of mental health therapists from these agencies to work in the schools to address student mental health needs.

We recognize the importance of continued counseling services during this time of pandemic and social distancing. As a result, our Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor, Sonya Miller, is offering telehealth therapy for students. Telehealth services can be used on any device with a camera and microphone. ### **FINANCE**

How Can Budgeting Help Me?

A budget is just a plan of how you are going to spend your money. Budgeting can help you reach your goals, whether that is, purchasing a big-ticket item, taking a trip, or just making sure you have enough to cover basic expenses.

#### **Budgeting Tips**

- Zero based budgeting This doesn't mean that you don't have any money. It simply means that you
  will designate a plan for all of your income. Your income minus your expenses equals zero. But
  remember, expenses can be actual savings account deposits.
- 2. Do the budget together—if you have a significant other, both of you need to be involved in a spending plan.
- 3. Every month is different—don't forget to plan for routine car maintenance and holidays, like birthdays and Christmas. Don't let special occasions sneak up on you. You should create a category for totally unexpected expenses savings.
- 4. Begin with the most important items first Once your basic needs are covered, food, shelter, clothes, and transportation, you can see how much you have available for other needs and wants. You may want to pay down debt that you have.
- 5. Trim the budget Figure out where you can adjust items to cover the things that are a necessity. Maybe you have to spend a few dollars less on an item to be able to cover something else.
- 6. Stick to your budget Realize that if you overspend your budget for one item, you will have to make adjustments in other areas.
- 7. Cash or credit card If you realize that you are constantly always overspending in certain categories, you may want to use cash for those categories. Each category would have an envelope. When the envelope is empty, there is no more to spend on that category. Credit cards can be helpful in some situations, but you should strive to pay them off each month. Interest on credit cards is typically high.
- 8. Review and adjust It usually takes about three months to be able to see a trend in your spending habits. Sit down with your significant other and decide where you need to make changes.


Most banks, including Citizens Guaranty Bank, offer free savings accounts very economically. You can deposit money into the savings account and only draw money out when you have to. This way, the money is not in your checking account, and you won't be tempted to spend it.

# **TEACHING & LEARNING**

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and under the guidance of Governor Beshear and the Kentucky Department of Education all schools transitioned to Non-Traditional Instruction. The Estill County Schools began a system of virtual instruction so students would be able to continue learning. Teachers created virtual and traditional lessons for students. Teachers met with students via Zoom and Google Hangouts. Students and teachers adapted very quickly to this new way of learning.

# **TECHNOLOGY**

WOW...what a year! The technology department has ordered 600 HP G8 EE chromebooks for grades 6-8, and hope to start setting those up in July/August to distribute to all middle school students. We will be disseminating the returned chromebooks (from graduating seniors) in 2 class sets for Estill Springs and 2 Class sets for West Irvine. This will strengthen the technology skills at the elementary level of incoming middle school students.

KDE is ramping up online registration for Infinite Campus. Hopefully this will allow for a more fluid registration and data upkeep for IC. They are also rolling out the Infinite Campus Learning Management System, to help with NTI days and remote learning.

With NTI this year, we're happy to report that tech issues were minor. Still having trouble with HP keyboards needing to be repaired, but thankfully that is an HP issue and doesn't cost the district anything.

For the coming 2020-2021 school year, NTI should be pretty fluid with 6-12 having chromebooks, provided teachers take advantage of the Google Classroom learning management system for assignments. We will be utilizing Little Sis again this year to automate Google Classroom creation and enrollment.

Finally, the school district is finalizing the backend configuration of our online employment application program, from PowerSchool. With this new system, we'll be able to control the job application process online, all the way from posting the position, to the applicant filling out the application, to interviewing, recommendations, to collection of required documents, and timelining the hiring process. It will greatly streamline the hiring process and we're excited to get it instituted.



# **TRANSPORTATIO**

The school district will be receiving three new 72 passenger school buses later this month, one of which is being funded by an EPA grant awarded to the district this past January. These new arrivals help to make sure our bus fleet continues to be updated and ensures that our pool of sub buses is reliable.

Work on the new bus garage continues to progress. The assembly phase of the steel structure will begin very soon. The road to the new facility is now in place and we hope to be on track to occupancy by late summer /early fall. This will be a facility that the transportation department can be proud of and will serve a great purpose.

The transportation department continues to work to make sure summer meal deliveries occur three days per week. 18-20 people from the department are traveling to six locations within the county to help get meals to school age children. I want to personally thank each of these employees for making sure this task gets carried out each week. Food service will continue for the next few weeks.

Finally, congratulations go out to Tim Burkhart on his retirement. Tim has served as Director of Transportation for 3 years, and principal of Estill County Middle school, before that. Congratulations Tim...we hope you "See the USA...in your Chevrolet!"
